Ham-Com Recap

Ham-Com 2013 has come and gone, and a good time was had by all. If you missed Randy Farmer W8FN's presentation on station building or Dick Weber K5IU's talk on antenna performance, you missed some excellent presentations. Yaesu had their entire line of radios on display, from the FTdx9000 down to the FT450 and handhelds, including the new FTdx1200 and FTdx3000 (which, if you're considering a 3000, you should check out Rob Sherwood's review). Kenwood had the TS-590 and TS-990 on display, and ICOM America as usual had their entire line of radios including the IC-7800 on display. Not to be forgotten, Elecraft had their K-Line on display, and local outfit Array Solutions had various goodies to show. Hopefully you were able to pick up all the things on your shopping list this year (if not, there's always next year).

Field Day Introduction

We keep talking about this Field Day thing lately and most of the time we probably think everyone knows what we're talking about, and probably most of you do. For the new or uninitiated, here's a brief introduction. Field Day is an annual operating event sponsored by the ARRL in which hams, groups of hams, or clubs set up temporary stations in places where no station infrastructure already exists, and then for a period of 24 hours attempt to make contact, usually on shortwave, with as many other stations across the country and worldwide as possible. These stations exchange pieces of information with each other and enter that into their log, which they submit to the sponsor afterwards, these contacts being part of a score each entrant claims. Bonus points are offered for various non-operating things such as inviting a public official and submitting a press release. The results are announced later in the year in the ARRL's magazine *QST*, and the top-ranking groups rightly earn bragging rights.

Arguably a contest (but there's disagreement), Field Day is the largest operating event of the year and has been an honored tradition for 80 years. Virtually every ham has a memorable story that involves Field Day, often their introduction to the hobby.

Presentation: Field Day Primer

With Field Day happening the day after this month's club meeting, this month we'll be doing a walk-through and primer for our Field Day operation. We'll be covering things like the station setup, a tutorial on the various radios we'll be using, how to use the computer logging software, some housekeeping items, and things of the sort. If you're planning to come out and operate Field Day with us (or even just help us set up or tear down), you want to make sure to be at the meeting this Friday so you'll be ready to go when Saturday morning rolls around. Station hosts should bring their logging computers so we can make sure they're configured correctly while we have time to do it.

Field Day

The countdown to Field Day is now down to the single digits. We hope you'll be here with us for it. Bill AE5BT has the barbecue dinner arranged, which is always excellent, complete with beans and potato salad. He does ask that we bring side dishes and desserts to go along with it as usual.

We will have the following stations to set up and operate:

HF SSB: a 5000MP with a tribander and wires

HF CW: a K3 with a Buddipole **HF Digital:** a 590S with a vertical

HF GOTA: a 746 Pro with a G5RV (daytime operation planned)

VHF: an FT-950 with a 6m beam, plus 2m vertical FM

We'll be using the new networked version of N3FJP's FD logger this year. It's very easy to use and should be able to track band changes directly from the radio over CAT.

Setup will begin at 9:00 am on Saturday, June 22. Between then and 1:00 pm (contest start time) we'll need to set up the radio room, raise the antennas, run the feedlines, set up the generator, plus a number of other things for which we will need your help.



Once the stations are operational, we hope to be able to be on the air making contacts continuously for the full 24 hours of the contest, tearing down the station after 1:00 pm Sunday. To operate the full 24, we will definitely need at least two relief shifts of operators: an overnight shift from about midnight to sunrise, and a morning shift to finish out the contest and help with tear-down afterwards.

We can't do Field Day without you, so please come out for fun, food, and lots of radio. As much or as little time as you can spend over the weekend would definitely be appreciated, plus we hope you'll have a good time.

Tidbits

Do you have some information you'd like us to include in the newsletter? Perhaps upgrading your station and have some spare equipment in need of a new home? Send an email to the editor, Wayne AD5ST (ad5st@arrl.net).

Do you use Times LMR400 coax at your station? It's excellent coax, but Frank Donovan W3LPL observed in his CTU13 talk that most of us using 400 haven't properly installed the connectors. You can see the entire talk in the CTU13 archive on ICOM America's Youtube channel (see *Contest Corner* for details), but the essence of it is that for 400, or any other coax with a Mylar foil shield beneath a braid, you need to use the proper crimp connector and tooling; soldering the braid to a PL259 will melt the foil that actually carries the RF return current.

On the subject of PL259 connectors, **do you know what make and model of connectors** you've installed on your RG213 coax? If they're from Radio Shack, a hamfest special with no marking, or otherwise you're not absolutely certain they're Amphenol 83-1SP connectors, you might want to replace them with 83-1SPs for reasons that Frank and Tim Duffy K3LR have noted in their CTU talks over the years. In Tim's words at CTU09 Italy, "No cheap." Quality connectors properly installed on quality coax should be expected to last 20 years, but cheap connectors poorly installed on bad coax might not even survive three months.

Do you occasionally (or frequently) need to send paper QSL cards but don't want the hassle of filling them out and mailing them, especially to DX, yourself? Jim Spaulding W0UO recently suggested using the GlobalQSL service at globalqsl.com. Started by some guys in 4X-land, GlobalQSL allows you to design a card, then submit an ADIF file from your logging program for the QSLs you want to send; they will print the card and mail it for you, for a very nominal fee. They also can provide blank cards like the other card printing outfits if you want some matching cards to fill out and mail yourself. If you're in the market for some new cards, especially for DX, check out GlobalQSL.

Contest Corner

The ARRL June VHF Contest was a bit of a letdown. Six meters had some okay openings up to W9 and W0, but not much beyond that, nothing like we experienced a couple of years ago. We're lucky here in W5 that we had conditions that good; the guys on the east coast, and even some on the west coast, say they never experienced any Es openings, only working locals while we had a couple of decent pipelines to the midwest. If you want to work VUCC in one weekend, this wasn't your time, but try again in next year's June VHF. When six meters is open, you don't need much at all in the way of antennas and power; when it isn't open, all the antenna gain and smash in the world won't help you.
